### Jeremy Weidman '03 Reflects on His Time in Beta Pi


Weidman 202 accelled the line of the chapter during my time as an undergrad. What I Weidman '03 recalls the high praises



# We Need Your Continued Support

To date, *The North Shall Increase* capital campaign has collected \$621,356.07 towards the chapter house renovations of recent years. These donations represent 82 percent of the total pledged commitment of \$759,349. Pledges continue to come in, but the frequency is slowing dramatically. It is concerning, as it impacts our society's ability to fulfill lender obligations and keep up ongoing expenses (e.g., building maintenance).

One of our current priorities is to collect campaign pledges that are behind schedule. If you have a past due pledge, a forthcoming pledge/gift coming up, we request that you fulfill the gift in a timely fashion.

The Beta Theta Pi Society of Minnesota is heavily leveraged with overall debt of \$603,786 comprised of the following:

Western-Bank Mortgage	\$162,167
Western-Bank Construction Loan	\$68,200
University of Minnesota Foundation Loan	
Chapter and Alumni Promissory Notes	
Other short-term credit debt	

The construction loan must be paid off in full by March 1, 2019.

Since the completion of our major chapter house renovation, we have been relying on the proceeds of campaign contributions to pay down the principal of the construction loan and other related debt. For us to meet this deadline, we need to collect on average \$11,000 per month.

It is imperative that donors send their donations in on time and for those who are delinquent on their pledges to submit their gift.

Thank you for your support. When you give, you help ensure that the active members continue having a well maintained chapter house, our alumni society fulfills its purpose, and we meet our financial obligations.

#### RECRUITMENT UPDATE

This fall was a difficult but rewarding time in the Greek community for both IFC and Panhellenic recruitment. IFC saw a decline in the number of men signed up for rush of roughly 40% from last year, with similar numbers for Panhellenic. With that, Beta saw a decline in our newest pledges of only about 20% while not sacrificing the quality of our pledges with a 17-man pledge class. This situation has kept us grounded in our values as an organization and given the chapter a welcome challenge in recruitment. We are excited about the quality men who have joined our organization and look forward welcoming them into the brotherhood.

Some things, like the spirit we show in the Homecoming competitions each year, will never change. Others, such as the names and majors of the men in the house, change over time. Here are some things that Beta Pi is anticipating this fall:

## HEADQUARTERS ROLLS OUT SUBSTANCE-FREE POLICY

Last February, Beta Theta Pi General Fraternity issued an extension of the substance-free housing program that includes all chapter houses, including ours. While certainly one of the larger changes we encounter this year, we recognize that it should not impact the strength of our brotherhood. I am optimistic that the new policy, which removes alcohol from the chapter house, will lead to a safer house for our members and guests.

#### ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

Betas have always given attention to cultivation of the intellect, and last semester we demonstrated this with the second-highest GPA on campus (3.36/4.00). At the same time, we

The Aurora Center provides survivors of sexual assault and relationship violence with resources and support on the U of M campus. We also anticipate continued service involvements with the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation, Southwest Seniors, Habitat for Humanity, People Serving People, and more.

# Renovations to the Chapter Room

Deferred from the spring and summer due to financial limitations, House Corporation alumni volunteers for the Beta Theta Pi Society of Minnesota are now planning to finally fix a significant water intrusion issue impacting the Beta Pi chapter house.

In and around the chapter room, water is leaking behind walls and running along the basement floor after heavy rain events. It is a constantly damp environment with a threat of mold, making it a safety threat and not a desirable space to be in. A new drain tile system will be installed, at an initial estimated cost of \$18,000. This will likely be paid for with a line of credit.

#### FINANCIAL UPDATE

The society's top area of focus is paying down the construction loan for the renovations that occurred in the summer of 2016.

Planned capital campaign gifts provided by alumni and chapter rent payments are earmarked for reducing this debt. In addition to paying down this construction debt, we also continue to manage a mortgage and a separate renovationrelated loan from the University of Minnesota Foundation.

Support from alumni is critical. Gifts of all amounts ensure we meet our financial commitments and address issues to the property at 1625 University Ave. that arise.
